- Southern region is in Krabi province.

2. Executive summary

This project is on “Promoting Thailand's Age-inclusive Disaster Risk Reduction” for a three-year period during July 2019 to June 2022. This project aims to strengthen the Older People Groups (OPGs) and Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) capacity to promote consolidation and expansion of age-inclusive DRR in Thailand and ASEAN. This project was implemented with three main target groups which includes OPGs and their members, including older people with disability; relevant and local, national and international, CSOs, and mass media; including Local Authorities (LAs) and government agencies. This project expected to reach the final beneficiaries totalling 16,000 persons during three years of the project period. The four purposes of the project to be achieved within the given period include 1) Sustainability, replication and scaling up impacts of Age inclusive DRR by implementing the Sub-grant and Ad-hoc Emergency Fund including technical supports; 2) Shared responsibility, complimentary, coordination and partnership by co-organising activities among collaborated multi-organisations and networks on DRR; 3) Integrated and targeted Age inclusive DRR by raising awareness and implementing policy engagement on DRR ; including 4) expanding capacity for building community and CSOs work on DRR. A summary of the situation, progressed activities, achievements, challenges, and next activities of the interim report of the project year 2 during July – December 2020 are included as follows.

During this reporting period, there were numerous severe natural disasters, both man-made and biological hazards, that occurred in Thailand and neighboring countries including at the global level. The natural disasters caused by seasonal storms and extreme weather caused **flash flooding nation-wide. These floods effected the provinces in the northern, north-eastern and western regions during the months of August to October. Provinces in the southern and eastern regions were also affected during the months of October to December**, including neighboring countries, which effected many people and their livelihoods including government and public infrastructure outside the project areas. In addition, the **biological hazard of the COVID-19 pandemic** in Chiang Mai, is still being felt nationwide and at the global level as outbreaks continue to fluctuate in Thailand and Neighboring countries. At this time, FOPDEV is able to mobilise the project’s Ad-hoc emergency fund and local resources to contribute towards and support the emergency response to older persons and their families. This also includes local leaders and volunteers who are affected by the bio-logical hazard of the COVID-19 pandemic. Prevention activities have also been implemented in order to help spread awareness of the **dangerous dust and air pollution, PM.2.5, in Chiang Mai** and neighboring provinces in collaboration with HelpAge International and the CSO networks on DRR during this reporting period.

During this reporting period 19 out of the 21 second-year planned activities were implemented according to the annual plan during July to December 2020. Two activities could not be organized and needed to be postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, including 3 activities such as attending the DRR courses and policy maker meetings and events at both the national and ASEAN levels. In addition, two activities such as the cross-exchange visit and a seminar at the ASEAN level have been excluded with the budget having been reallocated. As stated in the plan, these activities were the national network meeting, exchange visit and seminars activities. The project’s activities that were implemented and were used to create involvement

and contribution. For example, 8,743 older persons gained benefits with their CBDRR committees, CBOs, OPGs and CSO networks on DRR. Of these beneficiaries, 57% were women and 52% of the participants were from 22 OPGs in 8 targeted and expanded areas within existing and new provinces in Chiang Mai, Chiang Rai, Mae Hong Son, Khon Kaen and Krabi including Lampang, Kalasin, Lobburi respectively. A total of 43 participants were older persons and youth with disability with 70% being women of this target group. These groups were visited and supported by OPGs, CBDRR committees and participated CBOs in the area who continuously carried out home care visits. They often partnered together with village health volunteers and women groups in 6 communities located in targeted areas in Chiang Mai, Chiang Rai and Krabi provinces. The project's target groups of multi-partners joined in collaboration and were involved in implementing project activities which consisted of 2,634 persons, 67% being women. Of the involved participants, the project impacted a total of 11,377 persons and out of these beneficiaries they were either directly or indirectly involved in implementing the project's activities and gained benefits from the project achievements. These beneficiaries were located in the targeted communities of OPGs' members and project targeted groups during this reporting period. There were 75 representatives from 40 Local Authorities (LAs) and government agencies and 78 representatives from 36 CBOs and CSOs, including 4 academic institution and mass media agencies that participated and contributed to the project's activities in this reporting period, see detail on Annex A and Annex B.

The main achievements based on the results and outputs assessments from the implemented activities in this reporting period are detailed in Annex C as follows.

1) Achievements under Result 1: Sustainability, replication and scaling impacts of Age-inclusive DRR will achieve through strengthening the collaboration and capacity of existing CBOs & CSO network on DRR and partners on fund raising and Age-inclusive DRR sub-grants management for their implementation and expanding on Age inclusive on DRR and community resilience were as follow:

- 1.1) The FOPDEV project working group consisted of relevant members of CSO networks on DRR. This group has continuously arranged, managed and assessed the progresses and achievements of the first year and provided 13 sub-grant projects from their final reports and presentations during the national network meeting and seminars in October 2020. These sub-grants provided and helped implement the initiative type projects, with budget support for each sub-grant. Approximately GBP 1,250 (50,000 THB) budget support in 3-4 months periods during May to September 2020. These project sub-grants have been accelerated to expand and mainstream the age inclusive DRR to 9 CBOs and CSOs, including networks on DRR in both existing, targeted, and 4 new provinces which include Lampang in the northern region, Kalasin in the northeast region and Lopburi in the central region. Out of the 12 CBOs/OPGs, 8 are at the community level, 4 are at the sub-district level, and 1 CBO network on DRR is in Krabi province. Also included are the local government agencies, CSOs, private sectors, as well as community volunteers who have been involved in administering and accessing the project contributions, budget, and technical support, as well as acting as a learning network on DRR during this reporting period. These 13 implemented sub-grant projects generated participation and

involvement of the project target groups as reported in Annex A and Annex B above mentioned. There are two sub-grant projects on COVID-19 responses for assisting and reducing the impacted on their everyday living including health and income generating activities of older persons, persons with disability, community members that lost their job and closed their small business including legally workers from neighboring countries such as Myanmar etc. These sub-grants are included 1) The Krua Mae Oui (Grandma)'s kitchen against COVID-19 that led by Older Women leader and her OPG in Nong Hoi in Chiang Mai Municipality. The contributing activities are selling suitable price cooked foods to affordable local customers and preparing cooked foods including coordinating the instant food and cooking materials regularly distribute for free to targeted persons for three months. Thus, this activity could assist and contribute to 14,180 persons/times of the project beneficiaries 7,650 persons/times, 4,330 are women, are older persons and the rest are other people whom received the contributions including people who affordable to buy the cooked foods. The cookers of the OPG can be able to continuing carry on the small cooking business after the project end and beyond and 2) The COVID-19 Emergency relief in Ban Tha Klong Village, coastal and Muslim community in Krabi could be able to organise "Cash for Foods" that contributed to 84 older persons and the family members whom lost their job and have no income during the pandemic control. The rest 10 sub-grants projects have contributed to strengthen the sub-grantees (CBOs & OPGs) and their communities to preparedness to make plans and local resource mobilization to increased their capacities for creating better preparedness CBRRR and Age inclusion and community safety in the longer term.

- 1.2) The COVID-19 response activity in Krabi province followed up on the economic impact on tourism and businesses due to the pandemic. These activities in the province and nearby southern provinces supported those effected by sending aid to those who have lost their jobs and unable to send money back home in order to help their families, including older persons. Specifically, the project collaborated and supported two coastal communities, Ban Tha Klong, Koh Lanta District and Klong Prasong Sub-district, Muang District Krabi Province, to **survey and provide plain rice, essential home goods, and generic medicine to 80 older persons and their families**. A total of 60 older persons in Ban Tha Klong received 5 kilograms of plain rice and a total of 20 older persons in Klong Prasong sub-district received essential home goods and generic medicine during November 2020. These beneficiaries also included disabled older persons.
- 1.3) An accumulation of lessons learned and best practices were collected from the 13 first-year sub-grant projects on Age inclusive DRR, through the processes of field monitoring, online consultation, and the sub-grant project final report. Also included were the presentations at the national seminar and network on DRR & CCA meeting during October 2020. In addition, a short documentary and video clips were produced and disseminated via the project and the CSO's network on social media along with relevant mass media such as Citizen Reporter programme on Thai PBS etc.

2) Achievements under Result 2: Shared responsibility, Complementarity, Coordination and Partnerships will achieve through coordination and facilitation of experiential learning among CSO networks on DRR and volunteers on Age inclusive on DRR at local, national and ASEAN levels were as follows:

- 2.1) The project worked with two CSO networks on DRR at the sub-national level. **The first CSO network in Chiang Mai, Northern Thailand was the Chiang Mai Breath Council and her community and CSO networks, including relevant government partners in Chiang Mai.** The project collaborated and worked on sustainable forest fire management and the mitigation of PM 2.5 air pollutions in Chiang Mai and upper northern provinces. The second CSO network in Krabi, southern Thailand was **the Community Disaster Management Network – Krabi Provincial Administration Organisation (CDMN-KPAO).** The CDMN worked together with Krabi PAO, Prince of Songkla University (PSU) and Raks Thai Foundation to strengthen the capacity of leaders and technological communication networks. The aim was to enhance communication, coordination and collaboration among the network and Krabi-PAO on early warning signs and community preparedness in order to better respond to climate induced disasters and general public hazards in Krabi and neighboring provinces.
- 2.2) During October 27-30 2020 a national network event, that included a seminar, exchange visit, and collaboration meeting, was organized as the forum on Disaster Risk Reduction and Climate Change Adaptation Network in Thailand. This event titled, “Strong communities manage disaster risk reduction in engaging the elderly,” was held at Doi Pha Hom Pok National Park at the office of Pong Nam Ron Sub-district Administrative Organization, Fang District, Chiang Mai Province. A total of 70 participants were present at the event. These participants included a) representatives from 14 sub-grant recipient organizations, b) local authorities and local leaders, including CBDRM committees, c) safe school committees and d) forest fires prevention volunteers. Learning resources and sites in Ong Nam Ron, Sub-district included the ACSENT network’s partners such as Plan International Thailand, World Vision Foundation, Raks Thai Foundation, and the 3rd Red Cross Station-Chiang Mai Province.
- 2.3) The project compiled the report of 13 sub-grants that were implemented and used as exchange learning among sub-grantees, CBOs and CSO networks, as well as partners that worked on DRR especially at the project’s organised event at the national seminar and network meeting. The report is categorized into three parts which include a) preparedness to disaster risk reduction, b) vulnerable groups and risk mapping data collection and management and c) community-based emergency response to COVID-19 pandemic etc.
- 2.4) The electronic files of the project’s annual report year 1 was shared to COSE, Philippine and YEU, and Indonesia because of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic in ASEAN.

3) Achievements under Result 3: Integrated and Targeted Age-inclusive DRR will achieve through organizing an awareness raising and Policy Advocacy activities for promoting the adoption of DRR among relevant partners and stakeholders at local and national levels were as follows.

- 3.1) Four main outputs of public awareness raising of mainstreaming Age inclusive on DRR in CBOs and CSOs work on DRR and development during this reporting period included **1) project staff had regularly administered the Facebook page, DRRnet, of this project** at: <https://www.facebook.com/drrnetwork>. Via the Facebook page, the collection of stories, photos and video clips were shared of the project's subgrant implementations, including relevant information and media from CBOs and CSO networks and partners of both CSOs and Government agencies. At its peak, a total of 2,400 people visited the page and 315 people regularly engaged with the content. These people were from all over the nation with the two highest groups of people from Chiang Mai and Bangkok; **2) Three video clips of the project's sub-grants** successes were contributed for re-producing and broadcasting by interested mass media partners including the C-Site report program of Thai PBS and the national public TV Stations; **3) Encouraged the Forest Fire Prevention Volunteers in creating a Facebook page** in order to share their activities and events and disseminate information such as reports and updates. The Facebook page was also a useful tool for fundraising for forest fire prevention. The Facebook page can be found on Pong Nam Ron Sub-district Forest Fire Protection Volunteer at: [อาสาป้องกันดับไฟป่าโป่งน้ำร้อน - ฝาง PNR Fire VolunteerS | Facebook](#). **4) Production of Age inclusive DRR shirts and the dissemination of the campaign which** used IEC material to promote the project. This was promoted amongst the project's 30 trained community facilitators/speakers and 120 members of CBOs & CSOs networks on DRR and their partners.
- 3.2) Two activities on policy engagement with DDMP and the Ministry of Interior were carried out. These included the **1) contribution to the project's lessons learned article to Thailand's DRR lessons learned documentation of DDMP**. This was for the International Day of Disaster Risk Reduction, which took place on the 13th of October 2020. The article was on the elderly's roles and disaster risk reduction preparation at Ban San Klang, Mae Suai District, Chiang Rai Province; **2) advocating for the policy on civil societal network participation and contribution in disaster risk reduction management at the national level**. A video presentation was shown presenting Mr. Chainarong Wasanasomsit, Deputy Director of DDPM, Ministry of Interior to representatives of CBOs and CSOs network on DRR and partners. Furthermore, the participants who were a part of the project organised a national seminar and network meeting in Chiang Mai during October 17th-19th of 2020. This advocacy activity was carried out on the special occasion of the ASEAN Day for Disaster

Management 2020 (ADDM2020) and International Day for Disaster Risk Reduction (IDRR2020).

- 3.3) **Project staffs attended 3 of the online trainings series** that were organized by Hai for her country network members and partners in Asia and ASEAN region. The trainings included a) Age Assistive Technology in normal life and emergency in July 2020; b) Psycho-Social Support to older persons in Emergencies in August 2020 and c) Protection of Older Persons in emergency contexts in September 2020.

4) Achievements under Result 4: Capacity-building for communities and civil society organisations works on DRR will achieve through age friendly trainings and support to develop the model on age inclusive on CBDRR and community resilience which contribute to generate a culture of safety and resilience at all levels were as follow.

- 2.1) There were two training-models used to create community resource persons. These trainings included a **1) total of 26 OPGs, community leaders, and volunteers that have been completely trained to be community resource persons on Age inclusive on CBDRR preparedness and management. The participants were** from four targeted areas in Chiang Mai and Chiang Rai. They are now able to raise awareness, plan and implement their developed CBDRR plans, including local resource mobilisation, in collaboration with their communities and relevant local partners.; A **2) total of 20 Forest Fire Protection Volunteers in Pong Nam Ron Sub-district, Chiang Mai** were provided with on-site field training on sustainable community based forest resources and forest fire management. The volunteers have now increased their capacity to be community resource persons on this issue in the existing 150 rais (24 Hectares) of community forest with the support from local authorities and communities in the area. They have worked and contributed to on-site field training to 20 communities and locals interested in forest conservation, assessment of forest resources and carbon sequestration, and education on nature trail areas, including rehabilitation and forest fire protection. This successful output was co-funded with support from Irish Aid, ICMPS project of the Embassy of Ireland.
- 2.2) The project has provided a series of technical supports on field trainings, follow-up visits, access to academic resource persons, including access to and mobilization of resources in order to strengthen capacities to the CBDRR committees, OPGs, and community volunteers including their local partners of government agencies and CSOs in two targeted project areas. These improved capacities include the management and implementation of projects and CBDRR plans to better prepare communities for natural disasters, hazards, and risk-reduction, as well as, creating a safe community. **These two targeted areas are 1) Mae Suai Sub-district, Mae Suai District in Chiang Rai, which includes two communities that participated; Ban San Klang Moo 2 and Ban Den Phu Wiang, Moo 14 and 2) Pong Nam Ron Sub-district, Fang District,**

Chiang Mai. These increased capacities of CBDRR committees, community organisations, and local partners in the two targeted areas were as follow.

2.2.1) **Two of the CBDRR committees, OPGs, and local partners in Mae Suai sub-district, Chiang Rai** have increased their capacities for project management and problem analysis. This has led to appropriate project design and project proposal development to solve problems and improve community development in the long term. The CBDRR committee, OPG, and local partners in Ban San Klang Moo 2 received the project sub-grant fund to implement their project on community preparedness for disaster risk reduction and has already started to organise the school for older persons. This has been achieved with the collaboration of the district's Non-Formal Education Office in Ban San Klang's Primary School. In addition, the CBDRR committee, OPG, and local partners in Ban Den Phu Wiang Moo 14 reviewed and updated the CBDRR committee and its capacities. This included community data and essential knowledge of local wisdom on traditional herbal medicines and early warning signs of disasters, as well as their CBDRR plan and related community development activities. The CBDRR committee has prepared the project proposal on community preparedness with local wisdoms to disaster risk reduction project and has planned to access the project's sub-grant fund. The OPG has also been formed and has officially informed the Local Authorities. The OPG has applied to officially certify their OPG status at the Provincial Social Development and Human Security Office, in Chiang Rai. Thus, these two communities have been strengthened, their capacities increased, and local resources mobilized to ensure better community preparedness and increased resilience to natural and man-made disasters such as earthquakes, flash floods, from the Mae Suai Dam, forest fires, PM.2.5 air pollution, and the COVID-19 Pandemic.

2.2.2) **Pong Nam Rong Sub-district, Fang District, Chiang Mai:** The project has orchestrated activities to strengthen the capacity of the Forest Fire Prevention and Community Forest Resources Management volunteers. In addition to volunteers, also included in the project were their multi-partners working group on community-based forest fires prevention and forest resource management in Pong Nam Rong, Fang District, Chiang Mai. These volunteers and working groups have already initiated and managed the nature trail learning site, an educational series on forest fire protection, and forest rehabilitation and conservation in the 150 rai (24 Hectares) community forest of the Sangkla Temple in Pong Nam Ron. In addition, these volunteers are responsible of surveilling, protecting, and controlling forest fires in existing community forests and forest areas that are under the management of the Department of Royal Forestry and Doi Pha Hom Pok National Park. These forest fire prevention and community forest resources groups received co-funds for implementation from Irish Aid, Ireland Embassy during July to December 2020.

2.3) The project approved and supported one of **the project sub-grants of 50,000 Baht (Approx. 1,147 GBP) to the CBDRR committee of Ban San Klang, Moo 2, Mae Suai Sub-district, Chiang Rai.** This was in relation to the project

that helped create the community resource persons on Age inclusive CBDRR reported in activity 4.1. The trained CBDRM committee, with technical support from the project, is now able to initiate the CBDRR project and access the project sub-grant. As of now, they have received the sub-grant and have already started to implement their project for 3-4 months since December 2020.

- 2.4) The project was able to collaborate and engage in local policy on mainstreaming age inclusive practices on CBDRR in local development plans with two local authorities; Pong Nam Ron Tambon Administration Organisation (TAO) in Chiang Mai and Mae Suai Municipality, Chiang Rai. The local policy engagement activities that were organized included **1) Signing of the memorandum of understanding in cooperation with the implementation of disaster prevention and mitigation, and environmental agricultural policies, between the Foundation for Older Persons' Development and the Pong Nam Ron TAO.** and 2) Coordination and collaboration on mainstreaming age inclusive practices on CBDRR projects and older person development plans of Ban San Klang Moo2, Den Phu Wiang Moo14 and Ban Huai Nam Ma Moo15 into local Mae Suai TAO and the local authority's development plans. This also included local government agencies and CSOs, such as the Community Organisation Development Institute (CODI).

The overall project management year 2 has been on target with the project's plan and has allocated resources in the first six-month period of July 2020 to December 2020. **The Deputy Executive Director, as project advisor, three responsible staff, a few of requested field coordinators, along with some university student interns, helped allocate resources, implement activities, and overall were able to manage and execute this project.** One computer notebook was purchased for the assistant of project manager because the existing notebook computer that was provided did not work properly. **The grand total expenditures were 52.45% (GBP 36,712.61 = THB 1,465,076.92) implemented activities were 77%, human resources and management were 64% and the sub-grant and ad-hoc emergency funds were 8 % and 31 % respectively** as detailed in the interim financial report. The financial report indicates that there were some over expenditures pertaining to certain activities such as in the case of Result 2 on network activities and events and Result 4 on investing in the training curriculum for community facilitators on Age inclusive CBDRR. This training was also for existing OPGs & CBDRR committees in targeted communities. Expenditures also included the investment in capacity building activities and technical support, especially the technical consultant hired to assess forest resources and carbon sequestration. Expenditures also included preparing the nature trail learning paths and the community forest and forest fire management plan of Forest Fire Prevention Volunteers in Pong Nam Ron Sub-district. This plan has been co-funded with Irish Aid, ICMPS project, Ireland Embassy as mentioned above in project achievements. Thus, the over expenditures under Result 2 of national network activities designed to integrate the budget lines under Result 1 of activities number 1.1, 1.2, 1.6 including under Result 2 of activities number 2.1, 2.2, 2.3, 2.4, 2.5 and 2.8 to organise in one event of the national seminar and network meeting in October 2020. This meeting included sub-grantees, representatives of CBO & CSO networks on DRR, and partners. The over

expenditures under Result 4 on capacity building for communities and CSOs work on DRR was managed to balance the budget of activities under this result and the budget from Result 1 under activities 1.1 and 1.2. **Irish Aid, ICMPS project, Ireland Embassy in Thailand** was a **co-funding donor of this project**. This donor contributed GBP 3,637 (6%) of the total budget for this project which helped implement the community forest fire resources and management plans of Forest Fire Protection Volunteers and the Sub-district working on DRR in Pong Nam Ron, Chiang Mai during this reporting period.

4. What next?

The highlights of activities under 4 project results will be implemented in the next six months based on the activity plan and budget in year 2 of July 2020 – June 2021 in Annex E as follow.

1. Strengthen the collaboration and capacity of existing and new collaborated CBOs & CSOs and their network on DRR and CCA, public hazards including road safety and first aid skill for reducing disaster risks and safety life of people in the project areas through processing and technical supports of the Age inclusive DRR sub-grant and Ad-hoc Emergency funds of Year 2. The training on Social Impact Assessment (SIA) in collaboration with Salforest Co., Ltd. has planned to selected sub-grantees whom will ensure to implement the provided sub-grant projects that can be a success model and can be expand and scale up to CBO network on DRR. The project will prepare to plan the emergency responses and/or relief for older persons and their families whom will be affected and impacted from air pollutions PM.2.5 and COVID-19 in the project areas.
2. Strengthen the collaboration and exchange learning among CBOs & CSOs network on DRR and CCA both at sub-national and nation levels including not limit to share experiences online with collaborated partners of COSE, Philippines and YEU, Indonesia during uncertainty of COVID-19 pandemic. These networks on DRR & CCA and multi-partners at all levels will keep on looking for opportunity to working and learning together including collectively fund raising for supporting the agree on the network plans on preparedness plan to response, capacity buildings including awareness raising and policy engagement etc.
3. Keep on planning and implementing the public awareness raising activities and events on promoting Age inclusive DRR base on best practices and model from implemented of the project sub-grants and targeted communities. The awareness raising issues are including role of CBOs and CSOs contributing to DRR and CCA in Thailand and ASEAN including relevant COVID-19 Pandemic.
4. Collaborate with CSO networks on DRR and CCA to plan and actively participate in the relevant policy engagement at national and ASEAN level on relevant natural disasters, air pollution PM.2.5 hazards and biological hazards o COVID19 pandemic above mentioned.
5. Selectively attend to relevant DRR and public hazards courses, policy meetings and events including online meetings and learning activities and event at both national and ASEAN levels.
6. Keep on strengthening the capacities on Age inclusive on CBDRR including project management and resource mobilisation for OPGs, CBDRR committee, CBOs and their network including their partner in project targeted areas in Chiang Mai and Chiang Rai.

These capacity building activities are in areas on the Sub-grant management and fund raising and the Training of Trainer on Age inclusive CBDRR, Sustainable Community Forest Resources and Forest Fires management, Social Impact Assessment including public awareness and policy engagement as well as

7. Facilitate staff capacity building and strengthen the preparedness plan to responses to severely hazards on COVID-19 pandemic, air pollution PM.2.5 including seasonal natural disasters in Thailand.

These activities will be implemented in close collaboration with existing and new multi-partners and the CSO network on DRR and CCA including relevant government agencies and private sectors.
